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Executive Summary


Cardiff's history spans over 2,000 years and is widely influenced by the Romans and Normans. It is the main financial and business area in Wales. Cardiff is an important industrial centre for food processing, engineering, and industries such as media and film production. Investment has been significant in the city over the last few months, as major developments have been underway.

Cardiff Profile

Cardiff became the capital of Wales in 1955, and is one of Europe's smallest and newest capital cities. In addition, the city is Wales' largest city the UK's 11th largest. It is a significant tourist destination, welcoming millions each year. It is has progressed from a small settlement with the world's busiest port, to the modern capital it is today. The city was the first Fair Trade capital of the world and has more green spaces per person than any other UK core city.



Cardiff has a population of 361,200, compared with the UK. It has a greater proportion of its population aged 15 to 34, with a smaller percentage aged 40+. By 2036, Cardiff's population is predicted to increase by 20%.



Economic Overview


Cardiff is the economic capital of Wales and plays a key role in creating jobs. The economy is creating strong performance across a number of indicators, with jobs growth up and unemployment down. Although, Cardiff's total economic output is much higher than other parts of Wales, it compares poorly to top performing UK cities. Cardiff's development has focused on improving quality of life, attracting business, and increasing tourism. In order to increase productivity, the economy needs to shift towards attracting and creating higher value businesses. The improvements seen in both the Central Square and in Cardiff University's Innovation System indicate a shift taking place.

In 2017, the median gross weekly earnings of Cardiff residents working full time were £538.50, up 0.8% from 2016. These exceeded earnings of most major cities, although it is still below the UK average.

Business

Cardiff has transformed itself from an industrial city fuelled by coal, into a centre of financial services and science, technology and creative sector companies. It is home to large cap company head offices such as Peacocks, ITV, and Ricoh.

As one of the fastest growing cities in the UK, Cardiff is a great city for investment. The recent development has seen internationally competitive groups emerge in financial, creative, live sciences and advanced manufacturing areas. The investment in the regeneration of Central Square has the potential to support up to 30,000 jobs, and a whole new home for business in the heart of the city.

The table shows that 86.7% of enterprises within Cardiff are Micro, whereas 0.6% of enterprises are large. The majority of enterprises in Cardiff have between 1 and 9 employees. 78.7% of local units in Cardiff are Micro, but 0.7% of local units are large.

Eastern Business Park is one of Cardiff's largest business parks. Offering great facilities, with newly renovated restaurant, it is considered a great place for business to have an office. There are over 18 businesses within the park, including Cafex Communications and Victim Support Cymru.

Regus Castle Gate Business Park has a wide range of commercial properties. Offering a selection of facilities, with many employees commenting on the nice and professional atmosphere it offers. There are multiple businesses in the park, including Ibis and Redrow Homes.





Developments

There have been significant developments throughout Cardiff. The plans for the £180m renovation of the Metro Central hub were approved in 2018. This includes revamping the current facilities, as well as new stations for coach services and a cycle hub. This investment would bring thousands of high spending visitors into the city and region and boost the tourism industry.



The Central Quay development could see over 2 million sq ft of new office, retail and apartments alongside the River Taff. The first phase will include: 220,000 sq ft landmark office building, multi-storey car park, and a 200-bedroom hotel.

Transport

Cardiff has a network of excellent transport options, including train, bus, bicycle, car, and sometimes boat.

Trains run from Cardiff's Queen Street station to Cardiff Bay and city stops. Trains from Cardiff central station link to the Valleys and Vale of Glamorgan, as well as high speed links to London and other UK cities.

There are numerous pay and display, and multi-storey car parks around the city centre. Cardiff has Park & Ride services to the east, south and west of the city with additional services operating during events.

Cardiff bus runs an extensive system throughout Cardiff and the local area, travelling to Penarth and Barry. Stagecoach run services to surrounding areas such as Caerphilly, Tongwynlais, and the Valleys.

Cardiff Boat provides an hourly water-bus service between Bute Park and Cardiff Bay.

Leisure Overview

Cardiff is a great place to begin exploring. It us home to a rich historic background, with multiple historic landmarks.

Cardiff Castle is one of the most visited attractions in all of Wales. It is one of the best-preserved historic castles, with the oldest section dating back to as far as the 10th century.

The 'City of Arcades' are Cardiff's well-preserved and still bustling Victorian shopping arcades. The oldest of them, the Royal Arcade, built in 1858.

Cardiff Bay is a well worth expenditure of time. The Cardiff Bay redevelopment is one of the largest in

Europe, and is home to plenty of things to do, especially with kids.





Llandaff Cathedral is one of the best-known of Cardiff's churches. Built in the 1300s on the ruin of the original structure built 200 years earlier. It has an impressive 15th-century tower, and a fully restored 18th century Italian temple.

Cardiff is home to multiple leisure centres around the city. Cardiff international pool is a 50 metre Olympic swimming pool, suitable for kids and adults.

The Royal Mint experience in one of the UK's most fascinating attractions. It is a great place for the kids to watch how coins are made.

Llanishen leisure centre features a leisure pool with a wave machine and water play for kids and families.




Tourism

Tourism in Cardiff has increased over the past few years, as it experiences a record number of visitors during 2017. The total economic impact of tourism for 2017 is £1.3 billion, up 7% from 2016.

During 2017, 21.30 million people visited the city, 5% more than 2016. 2.06 million of these visitors stayed the night, an increase of 2% from 2016. 19.24 million people visited for a day, an increase of 5% from 2016.



In 2016, more than 20 million people visited Cardiff with an economic impact of £1.2bn. Between 2005 and 2016, the number of visitors has continued to increase, and is still increasing.




